This WebQuest is designed to get your students using their research skills, recognizing contextual clues and putting multiple sources of information to get the answer.

We hope they (and you!) find it a fun and challenging learning experience – discovering artists, songs and events past and present. It's great as a class or house competition. You can do the WebQuest all in one day or space out the questions throughout the month.

Any of the categories or questions can be a jumping off point for further inquiry, whether about using online resources, historical events like the Springbok Tour or current issues like internet surveillance. You can also challenge your students to write their own questions or create new categories.

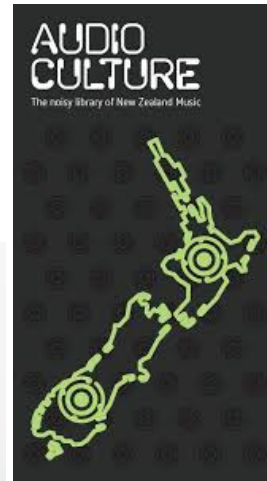

The Good Old Days of NZ Music

1. This master of the steel guitar and 2015 Hall of Fame inductee was born where and in what year?
2. This soul singer and piano player produced the first AND second #1 hits in in Te Reo. Who is he and what are the songs?
3. This band of musicians toured Australia, Europe and Asia in the 1950s and 1960s with their special mix of dance music, kapa haka and comedy skits. Though other, similar bands followed, they are considered the first true band of the genre.
4. This 1950s artist was known as “The Māori Cowboy.” What was his name and the name of his hit song about a special place in Whanganui?
5. This singer had two hits in 1969 and 1978 from songs he wrote about his sisters! One was named Tania. Who was the other one?
